

FROM THE PASTOR



I am well pleased with our parish celebration of the Easter Triduum. Holy Thursday, Good Friday, and Holy Saturday celebrate the heart of Christian faith: Jesus' redemptive death and resurrection. I believe blessing flowed to all who came to celebrate not only the Lord's redemptive work but ours as well. In supporting one another, praying side by side, and lifting up each other in

prayer we declared our allegiance to our local faith community and to the Church Universal.

Easter Sunday Masses were so well attended that a good number of parishioners and visitors had to stand. While the overflow of worshippers was wonderful to behold, experience has shown that this abundance tapers off as weeks pass. Would that it were not true this year.

The Easter Season refers to the *Great Fifty Days* from Easter Sunday to Pentecost Sunday, a celebration of our participation in Christ's resurrection which brings us from the death of sin to a life of grace. Its last ten days (Ascension Thursday through Pentecost) focus on the promise of the presence and power of the Holy Spirit. The fiftieth day (pente-) is seven (the perfect number) squared plus one (the first day of the New Life). The word *Easter* probably has roots in the Norse term *Eostur*, the season of the rising sun, or the time of the new birth of spring. Both these meanings lend themselves well to Christian symbolism for the new life of the risen Christ, the eternal light.

Let us continue to celebrate well this Easter Season with perfect attendance, lively singing, fervent prayer, joyful countenances, friendly gestures, and promises of spiritual growth and virtuous living.

My gratitude to all who worked behind the scenes to assure a successful Easter: musicians, cantors, choir, acolytes, ushers, lectors, sacristans, environment volunteers, Eucharistic ministers, deacons, and hospitality. Thank you so much!

Our eighth grade class trip to Washington, DC is this Saturday, April 13th. I will be joining the students and teachers. This will be my fourth expedition to our heritage sites. What pleases me most about my participation is getting to know our students better and vice-versa. I enjoy conversing, joking, teasing, and observing them. It is not only fun but educational. I am always amazed at the intelligence of our students and how well prepared they are for the historic places they will see.

The last day of the trip instead of flying back to Orange County I will fly from Washington to Chicago to visit my family and long time friends. My home visit at Christmas had to be cancelled due to my shoulder surgery. I'm indebted to Father Luke for the extra work while I am gone.

There are copies of *The Catholic Worker* on the bulletin shelves in church. On the back page is an article written by Megan Fincher entitled *Contemplation and the Laity*. She writes about her experience of entering into the contemplative dimension of prayer. She quotes Father Thomas Keating who was her mentor and guide: "Centering prayer is a contemporary expression of the ancient practice of contemplation as interpreted by the Fathers and Mothers of the Desert....It belongs by right not only to monastics but to all Christians in virtue of their common baptism....Right now there are about two billion Christians on the

planet. If a significant portion of them were to embrace the contemplative dimension of the Gospel, the emerging global society would experience a powerful surge toward enduring peace." Allowing some quiet time apart from the distractions of technology lends itself to a more thoughtful and contemplative prayer life.

You may have noticed the construction progress on *Our Lady of Grace* grotto, a project of the Knights of Columbus. At the time the Parish Center was built, the grotto which stood between the rectory and school had to be demolished. The new grotto is situated on the landscaped area of the church building facing the parking lot. Once the final touches are in place and the statue installed we will have a proper dedication and blessing. We owe our thanks to the Knights for financing this undertaking for us to enjoy.

A project that is sorely in need of our attention is the condition of the church bathrooms. Those who use them know full well that despite our best efforts to keep them clean and in repair we fall short of both because of the street traffic and outdated facilities. I have asked our finance and facilities committees to perform a feasibility study and determine the costs. Besides the bathrooms, the carpeting in church needs to be replaced. It is worn and frayed. The church doors are not only an eye sore but increasingly difficult to open. They need to be replaced at some point. At present we do not have the money to perform all of these upgrades. Is there something we *can* do? Do you have any suggestions?

During a recent monthly meeting of the Fullerton Interfaith Ministerial Association (FIMA) I suggested to the membership that we brain storm about the possibility of planning a "first ever" interfaith religious Faire to be held here at St. Juliana sometime in August. The Parish Center which serves as neutral ground would be the site of the Faire. All faith communities, Christian and non-Christian would have space to set-up a display explaining the basic tenets of their faith with handouts, etc. There would be a key-note speaker, music, finger food and snacks, and time to browse, ask questions, and for all to get to know one another in a spirit cooperation and respect. This Faire could be an opportunity for young and old members of Fullerton and environs to explore faith and religion in new and creative ways. This would be an occasion for those who are unchurched to reconsider and perhaps begin a new relationship with organized religion. The next meeting will be this Thursday, April 11th and at that time the membership will discuss the future of this idea. It will entail work and time, but I believe it will be worth it. What do you think?

This FIMA project brought to mind a quip by Royce Addington published in *Bits and Pieces* a division of Lawrence Regan Communications, Inc. It goes like this: *The most sacred place dwells within our heart, where dreams are born and secrets sleep, a mystical refuge of darkness and light, fear and conquest, adventure and discovery, challenge and transformation. Our heart speaks for our soul every moment while we are alive. Listen…as the whispering beat repeats: be…gin, be…gin, be…gin. It's really that simple. Just begin…again.*

Divine Mercy Sunday is a Roman Catholic solemnity celebrated on the Sunday after Easter, the Octave of Easter. It is originally based on the Catholic devotion to the Divine Mercy that Saint Faustina Kowalska reported as part of her encounter with Jesus, and is associated with special promises from Jesus and indulgences issued by the Church.

This feast of Divine Mercy, as recorded in the diary of Saint Faustina, receives from Jesus himself the biggest promises of Grace related to the Devotion of Divine Mercy. In specific Jesus

states that the soul that goes to Sacramental Confession (the confession may take place some days before), and receive Holy Eucharistic Communion on that day, shall obtain the total forgiveness of all sins and punishment. Additionally, the Roman Catholic Church grants a plenary indulgence (observing the usual rules) with the recitation of prayers.



RCIA MYSTAGOGY

Mystagogy, in simpler terms, is the period after the rites of initiation into the Catholic Church. **It's a time for settling in**. Have you ever started a new job? A new school? A new family? It's exciting to begin, but those first steps can be wobbly. We rely on people around us to help us feel at home. That's the purpose of mystagogy.

Mystagogy affects new members and old members alike. New-comers deepen their understanding of what happened to them at Easter. Their presence in the community brings new life to those who have been members for a while. In your kitchen you may have followed the same recipe a hundred times. But when your friends taste the results for the first time, their enthusiasm brings new pride to your work, new joy in the meal, new life to an old dish. Mystagogy enriches the whole community.

YEAR OF FAITH

April 2013 Easter Time: Call to Evangelization

Meditation

Faith enabled the disciples to form the first community, united by the apostles' teaching, common prayer, celebration of the Eucharist, and holding all possessions in common to provide for the needs of all (see Benedict XVI, Door of Faith, 13).

In this Year of Faith, April encompasses Easter's Fifty Days, during which Resurrection joy should overflow the hearts of believers to refresh a parched and weary world with the revivifying waters of faith, hope, and charity. All month, at every Mass, we read Luke's Acts of the Apostles, charting the young church's Spirit-led journey, sometimes peaceful, sometimes persecuted, beset by enemies without and turmoil within. But this young church is always moving onward, from Jerusalem's familiarity to the strangeness of every place between there and Rome; and outward, from an inherited Judaism's comfortable uniformity to the Gentile world's challenging diversity. A week after Easter, Divine Mercy Sunday invites us to renew our personal relationship with Jesus, a principal element of this Year of Faith. On the Third Sunday of Easter, Peter's net is not torn, despite its one hundred fifty-three fish (one of every kind!), an image of the Church's unity-in-diversity safeguarded by communion with Peter. On Good Shepherd Sunday, the church prays for priestly and religious vocations. All the while, Acts shows people drawn to the early Church because they had seen the Risen Jesus not in person, but in persons, in disciples who still form Christ's living Body, the Church.

Be the kind of disciple, personally and in communion with my brothers and sisters, in whom those who seek Jesus may at least glimpse the presence of Jesus.



The Importance of St. Peregrine Today

St. Peregrine was healed of a cancerous ulcer on his leg which was considered beyond saving. The fame of this event in 1325 spread rapidly round the western Church. Christians, and especially the sick, began to invoke his name and seek his intercession for the relief of their suffering and even for a cure from sickness. The canonization of St. Peregrine in 1726 increased people's devotion to him which spread to the universal Church.



Even with great developments in medicine, there are still many diseases which are incurable. Some of them are claiming more and more victims. Because of this, the prayers to this saint are becoming more intense and more frequent because this was a person who knew suffering and sickness in his life and also knew the power of divine grace helping him. The Servite family – with its friars, sisters, secular, and lay members – is committed across the world to offering a "ministry of compassion" in a spirit of service towards those who are sick and suffering.

"DO NOT BE AFRAID."

Did you notice? Today is called the "Second Sunday of Easter," not the "First Sunday after Easter." Our celebration of Easter is not over. These Sundays of Easter continue to present the mystery of Jesus Christ's victory.

The readings begin with the "signs and wonders" abounding in those earliest days. Sick people lay in the street, hoping that at least Peter's "shadow might fall on one or another of them." Then, in a powerful passage from the book of Revelation, the visionary falls down "as though dead" upon seeing the victorious Christ. But Christ extends a gentle touch: "Do not be afraid . . . once I was dead, but now I am alive forever."

In the Gospel, that same Christ appears and breathes on the disciples, and gently leads Thomas to believe. This Christ—more powerful than any evil force, victorious over death itself—touches us and whispers, "Do not be afraid."
