



FROM THE PASTOR



Bishop Vann's visit to the parish last Sunday was truly a delight. His warmth, concern for parishioners and staff along with his generally relaxed demeanor made it easy to communicate with him and to hear him speak of how much he enjoyed being with us. Everything about his visit indicated to me how down to earth he is. I had a chance to spend some private time with him and his support and encouragement lifted my spirits. He was

impressed with all the ministers at Mass. He especially liked the music: choir, organ, cantor and congregational singing. Thanks to music director Todd Helm, choir members, organist Claudia Kellogg, cantor Monette Velasco and to all of St. Juliana parishioners who prayed in word and song last Sunday with such exuberance. The bishop was genuinely moved and wants to come spend a weekend with us as he has done in other parishes. My thanks to our hospitality committee who provided more than our usual coffee and donuts.

After months of planning, the Fall Festival continues this weekend. I wish to thank Chairman John Kohaut, the entire festival committee, booth chairpersons and all the volunteers for devoting so much time to the success of this yearly celebration. Without you, the Fall Festival could not happen. The influence of this fiesta is far reaching. The entire Fullerton community profits from our collective skill in entertaining, feeding, and providing a wholesome fun atmosphere for the entire family. We all should feel a strong sense of pride this weekend.

October is traditionally the month of the *Holy Rosary*. If you have not prayed the rosary recently or have not prayed this beloved devotion in the past, this may be a good time to reacquaint yourself with the rosary and begin praying it. Following the 8am daily Mass, a group of faithful parishioners pray the rosary in the family chapel room of the church. Why not join them? If you attend the 6:30am daily Mass, bring your rosary with you and I will lead the rosary following Mass on those days I am the celebrant.

The daily Mass readings last week featured selections from the Jewish Scriptures' (Old Testament) book of *Ezra*. A reflection that appeared in the devotional booklet, *The Word Among Us* for Tuesday, September 24th encourages us to appreciate the sacred space we call *Church*. While the Church is more than just a building, it is also the worshipping community. However, the building plays a key role in calling us to assemble and praise God in *Word*, *Song*, *and Sacrament*.

The reading from Ezra recalls the time when the Jewish people are returning from exile in Babylon and are in the process of rebuilding the Temple in Jerusalem. This was about 500 years before the birth of Jesus. The author of the reflection writes: "If you look around your church on any given Sunday, you will see all kinds of signs of the people who helped build it. Perhaps a plaque lists donors. Perhaps a sculptor or painter signed his work. Perhaps a friend remembers laying bricks or installing carpeting. Each of these builders invested himself or herself in the worship space. Each had a personal reason to celebrate when the church was dedicated...No matter how long our church building has been standing, each of us is also a church builder. We all bring our own particular gifts and talents with us when we approach the altar. At the same time, the Lord wants us to put our talents to work for him so that his church continues to grow and spread. In a sense, the church is incomplete without our gifts. Like the prophets in Ezra's time, some of us have the gift of welcoming and encouraging people. Some of us help make the worship space beautiful by **tending** the flowers

and laundering the linens. Some people proclaim the word or help lead the singing. Some come together to help make long-term decisions that will affect the whole parish. Some teach CCD (PSR), while others plan social events. Even those who are not physically able to come to Mass can be intimately joined to us in prayer. And on top of all of this, we all make our worship space come to life when we worship the Lord and receive his Body and Blood...So what will you bring this week? How will you help build the Church?"

I found an article in the *National Catholic Register* that parents in the parish may find helpful. The title of the article is, *Raising* Catholic Kids. The author, Lucy Rabideau, at Catholicicing.com discusses "6 Ways to Pass on the Catholic Faith to Your Children." She writes, 1.) Teach them the basics. Your kids need to have an understanding of the basics from a young age. Basics such as...the True presence in the Eucharist, why we have saints, what the Mass is all about, and the amazing blessing the bible is to all Christians. 2.) Saturate the home. Fill your home with prayers, love, Christian virtues, and yes, even statues, pictures, medals and other reminders of our religious heroes. 3.) Make religion relatable and engaging for children. Meet them at their own level! For me, I have used a lot of crafts, activities, and songs to reach my children with the word of God at their own level. 4.) Make sure they get a good Catholic education...it has to come from you, the parent. 5.) Weave the faith into your life. Do not let the faith be like a puzzle piece in your life that could be plucked out and tossed aside. 6.) Lead by example. The "whole do-what-I-say-and-not-what-I-do thing." Yes, that's not going to cut it."

The October meeting of our JHYM (Junior High Youth Ministry) on Wednesday, October 9th from 7:30 to 9:00pm in the Parish Center, Seven Holy Founders Room promises to be a heartfelt gathering. On that night, there will be a very special presentation by a very special young man, Hal Hargrave. Hal broke his neck, incurred a spinal cord injury, in a traffic accident in 2007. Paralyzed, confined to a wheelchair, Hal stays unbelievably busy. Hal goes to college, constantly works at his recovery, and runs his "Be Perfect Foundation," which contributes greatly to the recovery of others who have suffered spinal cord injuries, and more. He is extremely inspiring and motivating. This program is made possible by the devoted leadership of Scott Kambak and I urge all of our Junior High students to attend.

Our parish participation in *For Christ Forever* capital campaign continues to move forward. I wish to thank Curtis Wesseln and the volunteers who worked so hard these past weeks setting up the meetings and welcoming donors. Kelly Storrs from *Guidance in Giving* attended all the meetings and her presentation as our representative with the Diocese of Orange brought a heartfelt warmth and professionalism to our collective encounters. Despite being over two thousand miles away from home and living out of a suitcase, Kelly's smile and affability helped create a friendly atmosphere so important when asking for financial support.

NOTES FROM MUSIC MINISTRY By Todd Helm, Music Director

Last Sunday, we had the honor of having Bishop Kevin Vann preside at the 9:00 Mass. Not only was he warm and welcoming, but he sang all the hymns and liturgical music with confidence and commitment - and he was on a microphone for all to hear! This is nothing new to our parish, of course, since we are very fortunate to have priests and deacons who do the same on a weekly basis. According to the General Instruction of the Roman Missal (GIRM) published by the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops, "The Christian faithful who come together as one in expectation of the Lord's coming are instructed by the Apostle Paul to sing together Psalms, hymns, and spiritual canticles (cf. Col 3:16). Singing is the sign of the heart's joy (cf. Acts 2:46). Thus St. Augustine says rightly, "Singing is for one who loves," and there is also an ancient proverb: "Whoever sings prays twice over."

When I left my position at a Brethren church to come to St. Juliana many years ago, the minister mentioned that my new job would be easier, since there wouldn't be as much music to prepare for the Catholic Church. How wrong she was! We Catholics not only sing the standard hymns that our Protestant brothers and sisters sing every Sunday, but we also add all the liturgical music that is the cornerstone to our weekly celebrations. (I do acknowledge that Lutherans and Episcopalians share this quantity of music as well). To make the music of our Mass truly an act of communal prayer and celebration, I think it is important to understand the "many parts" of this "one body".

The Cantor. The cantor's job is to lead the assembly in song, with "lead" being the operative word. The cantor is not giving a concert. The only parts of the Mass the cantor sings alone are the initial antiphon and verses of the Responsorial Psalm, the initial antiphon and verse of the Gospel Acclamation, and depending on the selection, the verses of the Communion song.

The Choir. The choir has a variety of roles. In some cases, they are an entity to themselves, singing music that they have prepared to be their offering to the celebration. This happens during the Presentation of Gifts and often times during Communion. At other times, the choir is meant to be the voice of the assembly, whose job it is to encourage communal singing by the entire congregation. This is the case during all the hymns, as well as the antiphons of the Psalm and Gospel Acclamation. In the singing of the Gloria, the choir becomes not only the voice of the assembly, but also the voice of the cantor as they also sing the verses.

<u>The Assembly</u>. The assembly is the most crucial element to the music of the Mass, as they are meant to sing the majority of the music. It is the role of the people to sing all hymns, the antiphon of the Gloria and Psalm, and all Eucharistic music (Holy, Memorial Acclamation, Great Amen and Lamb of God). The assembly may also sing the entire Gloria (antiphon and verses) if they so desire.

We are beginning to pay more attention to the affect amplification has on the music of our Masses. You may notice that the cantors are beginning to pull away from the microphone during the parts of the Mass that are meant to be sung by the assembly. This is a work-in-progress and I am fully aware that it is going to take some getting used to, but I ask that you be patient as your ears adjust to the wonderful sounds of our congregation lifting their collective voice in praise to our Lord. Let us all be inspired by Bishop Vann and our Priests and Deacons and continue to raise our voices in song.

Next week I will be discussing how our songs and hymns are chosen.



CATHOLICISM 101



Every Sunday we make a solemn profession of our faith by reciting the Nicene Creed. It is a summary of faith expressed by the Councils of Nicaea (325 A.D.) and the Council of Constantinople (381 A.D.). It has been an essential element of the Sunday Liturgy since the Sixth Century.

The purpose of this Profession of Faith is to allow the gathered people an opportunity to respond to the Word of God that was proclaimed in the readings. It also calls to mind the great mysteries of our faith that we will celebrate in the Liturgy of the Eucharist. The New translation of the Nicene Creed contains a few new words that will once again challenge us, so it will take a little getting used to before it becomes familiar. One of those words is "consubstantial" which professes that Jesus and the Father are of one substance, One God. Another word that will challenge us in the Creed is "incarnate"; this too reveals that Jesus the Son of God was given a human body through the motherhood of the Blessed Virgin Mary. 
